

From the Desk of the Superintendent

Dear FCSD Community Members,

I want to express gratitude to our students, families, faculty, staff, administrators, agency partners and our entire community for your support throughout our 2022-23 school year.

The Fulton City School District continues to prioritize literacy and instruction, multi-tiered systems of academic and social-emotional support and communication systems to achieve our mission and vision for every student, every day.

Some highlights of our success this year include:

- Expanded supports and interventions for students' academic and social development in every building and grade level
- Addition of full-day preschool program
- Renewed and expanded participation in athletics and extracurricular activities
- Career exploration and readiness programs beginning in elementary school and continuing through high school
- Summer enrichment programs
- Targeted professional development to support ongoing innovation by our educators
- · Enhanced health and safety measures throughout our district

I am pleased to share with you the Board of Education adopted budget for the 2023-24 school year. If approved by voters, the budget would result in a 0% increase to the tax levy. On Tuesday, May 16, 2023, residents of the Fulton City School District will have the opportunity to vote on the budget for our next school year. I encourage all registered voters in our school district community to participate in this important process. We have a change this year as there will be two voting sites: East Side will be the City of Fulton Community Room (141 South First Street, Fulton, NY) and West Side will be the Fulton War Memorial (609 W. Broadway, Fulton, NY). Please see our website, this newsletter or the separate postcard that was mailed with information.

The proposed budget takes into consideration present and anticipated student needs, ensuring program and resource sustainability and capacity as part of three-to-five-year budget forecasting and inflationary impacts on daily business. The 2023-24 budget aligns with and supports the Fulton City School District 5-Year Strategic Coherence Plan which clearly outlines our district's goals and strategies to achieve our vision and mission and to ensure coherence in everything we do. In each budget cycle we will assess the impacts of the resources and adjust to meet the defined needs of students.

Additional propositions for voters to consider are:

- Authorization for the purchase of one (1) mini wheelchair bus and two (2) seven passenger vans for transportation
- Three (3) members to the Board of Education
- \$20,000,000 Capital Improvement Project (0% Estimated Change in Tax Levy)
- \$10,000,000 Capital Reserve
- Authorization of a \$493,543 Fulton Public Library Tax Proposition
- Two (2) members to the Fulton Public Library Board

CAPITAL PROJECT AT FCSD

With current capital projects wrapping up, FCSD is ready to undertake a new series of improvements, renovations and additions to district facilities. A new \$20 million proposed project would help address health, safety and infrastructure issues throughout the district. Funded through debt issuance (bonds/BANs), the project would have an estimated impact of \$0 to the tax levy.

The Capital Reserve proposition requests the creation of a capital reserve with a \$10,000,000 maximum deposit and a 15-year lifespan. Funds deposited into the reserve would, with voter approval, be used to pay for capital additions and renovations to all district facilities. Use of these funds reduces the tax burden for residents on future capital projects. A capital reserve would also provide flexibility to the district in planning new capital projects. The district's existing capital reserve is nearing the end of its approved lifespan.

FREQUENTY ASKED OUESTIONS

How much is the budget changing and what is included?

The proposed 2023-2024 budget of \$84,155,000 is \$5,026,000, or 6.35%, more than this year's current spending plan. The proposed budget includes the continuation of all current programs, increases for contractual salaries and benefits, and anticipated cost increases due to inflationary pressures.

How does this budget affect my taxes?

The proposed budget is built with a 0% increase to the tax levy. An individual's property tax bill may change up or down from the prior year's bill as a result of changes to assessed property value and equalization rates.

What is the contingent budget?

A contingent budget prohibits a district from spending money in certain areas, such as community use of facilities, unless all costs are reimbursed to the district; most equipment purchases; maintenance, unless safety is at stake; certain field trips; and some educational supplies.

How does the Fulton City School District Compare to other districts on per-pupil expenditures?

Fulton spends less in both general and special education on a per-pupil basis compared to districts in the county and across the state.

Propositions

PROPOSITION NO. 1: BUDGET PROPOSITION

Shall the Fulton City District Board of Education be authorized to expend the sum of \$84,155,000 as a general fund appropriation for 2023-2024 school year and to levy the necessary tax therefore?

PROPOSITION NO. 2: Student transportation vehicles

Shall the Bond Resolution adopted by the Board of Education of the City School District of the City of Fulton authorizing the purchase of one (1) replacement mini school bus with wheelchair accessibility and two (2) replacement 7-passenger vans, including related furnishings and equipment incidental thereto, at a total estimated cost not to exceed \$240,000, and the payment of the costs of the buses by the levy of a tax upon all the taxable real property of the District in the amount of \$240,000 which tax shall be levied and collected in annual installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education and, if necessary, in anticipation of such tax the issuance of bonds and bond anticipation notes in the principal amount not to exceed \$240,000 and the levy of a tax to pay the interest on said obligations, be approved?

PROPOSITION NO. 3: CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

Shall the Bond Resolution adopted by the Board of Education authorizing the construction, renovations and improvements to Volney Elementary School, Fairgrieve Elementary School, Granby Elementary School, Lanigan Elementary School, Fulton Junior High School, Education Center, G. Ray Bodley High School and the High School Athletic Complex, including, but not limited to, alterations, site improvements, athletic field and playground improvements, mechanical, electrical, HVAC and security upgrades, original furnishings, fixtures and equipment required for such purposes, architectural fees, and all other necessary costs incidental to such work at a total estimated cost not to exceed \$20,000,000 and the payment of the costs of the Project by the levy of a tax upon all the taxable real property of the District in the amount of \$20,000,000, subject to any available State Aid, which tax shall be levied and collected in annual installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education and, in anticipation of such tax, the issuance of bonds and bond anticipation notes in the principal amount not to exceed \$20,000,000 and the levy of a tax to pay the interest on said obligations, be approved?

PROPOSITION NO. 4: CAPITAL RESERVE

Shall the Board of Education of the Fulton City School District, be authorized to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for a fifteen-year term pursuant to Section 3651 of the Education Law and fund such fund in an amount not to exceed \$10,000,000, inclusive of accrued interest and other investment earnings, to be used for renovations and additions to all District facilities, including purchase of equipment, technology upgrades, classroom equipment and/or school infrastructure equipment, site development, athletic fields, storm and sanitary sewer, driveways,

and parking lots, such reserve fund to be funded from (i) the balance on deposit in the existing capital reserve fund, (ii) year-end budget surplus funds known as unassigned fund balance, as available, for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2023 and each fiscal year thereafter for the term of the reserve fund, (iii) transfers of excess monies from Board of Education designated reserves, (iv) amounts from budgetary appropriations from time to time, and (v) New York State Aid received and made available by the Board of Education from time to time, all as permitted by law?

PROPOSITION NO.5: LIBRARY TAX PROPOSITION

Shall the Fulton Public Library Board of Trustees be authorized to levy and collect an annual tax, separate and apart from the annual school district budget, in the amount of \$493,543 (which is an increase of \$23,502 from the \$470,041 levy currently in existence) for the continuing support and maintenance of the Fulton Public Library, with this appropriated amount to be the annual appropriation until thereafter modified by a future vote by the taxpayers of the Fulton City School District?

- Who is not otherwise ineligible to vote under the provisions of section 5-106 of the Election Law






BUDGET PERCENTAGES
