Frequently Asked Questions & Important Information

How much is the budget changing and what is included?

The proposed 2021-2022 budget of \$76,230,000 is \$2,453,000 or 3.3% more than this year's current spending plan. Included in the budget are funds to continue the District's investments in the following:

- Our commitment to the Oswego County Literacy Initiative and belief that all students will read at or above grade level by the end of third grade,
- Our commitment to our digital learning initiative through which all students have Chromebooks and access to internet during remote learning,
- Our commitment to build upon the first year success of drone pilot certification program.
- Our commitment to expand early college high school programs (Information Technologies and Health Careers) plus post-secondary programs,
- Our commitment to deliver a strong instructional program that is responsive to students' post-pandemic needs including mental health supports, and
- Our commitment to maintain and upgrade infrastructure to support technologies.

Additionally, increases for contractual salaries and benefits are included as well as inflationary increases which affect transportation, operations and facilities.

How does this budget affect my taxes?

This proposed budget is built with the same tax levy as this year's budget. The tax rate is based on the overall assessed value of the property in the city and towns and the equalization rate for each specific municipality. Equalization rates are set by the NY Office of Real Property Services and are published in late July or August. An individual property's tax bill will be determined by these factors and may change up or down from the prior year's bill as a result. The District has a zero percent change in the amount it is collecting through the tax levy.

What is the Contingent Budget?

If the voters do not approve this budget on May 18, the District has two options: resubmit the same or modified proposal for a re-vote on June 15, or adopt a contingent budget. If the community votes down the re-submitted budget, then the District MUST adopt a contingent budget. Adopting a contingent budget prohibits a district from spending money in certain areas, such as community use of facilities unless all costs are reimbursed to the district, most equipment purchases, maintenance unless safety is at stake, and certain field trips and educational supplies. The rules for contingent budgets now require a zero percent cap on the tax levy. If it is necessary to go to a contingent budget, the budget would be \$76,080,000 which is a 3.1% increase over the current budget.

How does the Fulton City School District compare to other districts on per pupil expenditures?

The NYS Education Department reports this information on a two-year lag. When you compare Fulton to all schools in the state and to districts like Fulton, you can see that we spend less in both general and special education on a per pupil basis. Not only does Fulton spend less than its counterparts, Fulton has fewer available financial resources available than many other districts. The District works diligently to provide a quality cost-effective education to its students.

In the event of a contingent budget, non-contingent expenses would need to be removed from the budget. Most equipment and some equipment purchases as well as some student supplies and district funded field trips would be eliminated. Some facility maintenance not required for student or staff safety may be postponed. Community use of Facilities would be curtailed unless all costs were recovered from the community group.

Dear FCSD Community Members,

I hope this correspondence finds you and your family well. The past year has been one like no other we have experienced. I want to express my heartfelt thanks to our students, families, faculty, staff, administrators, agency partners, and our entire

community for your flexibility and support during these truly fluid times. I am pleased to share the 2021-22 budget adopted by the Fulton City School District Board of Education. On Tuesday, May 18, 2021, district residents will have the opportunity to vote on the budget for the 2021-22 school year. I encourage all registered voters in our school district community to participate in this important process.

Propositions to be voted upon include:

- •Authorization for school budget of \$76,230,000
- •Authorization for the purchase of one (1) wheelchair bus for transportation
- •Two members to the Board of Education
- •Authorization of a \$447,384 library tax proposition
- •Two members to the Fulton Public Library Board

This budget was developed with input gathered through presentations at Board of Education meetings and workshops, feedback from a FCSD stakeholder budget committee, updates with and feedback from each school's site-based, decision-making team, updates/reports in BoardDocs, located in the Board of Education section of the district website, and on a dedicated "Budget" section of the website.

The proposed budget of \$76,230,000 was adopted by the Board of Education on April 20, 2021. It includes a spending increase of 3.3% or \$2,453,000 over the current year's budget. The FCSD 2021-22 balanced budget has been designed based on a 7.35% increase in total state aid of which there was an increase in NYS Foundation Aid of \$1,426,043 (4%). A \$356,874 planned use of FCSD reserves has been applied with the result being a 0% change in the FCSD tax levy which is the total amount of revenue that is raised through taxation from all property owners in the district to fund the school budget. Therefore, the overall total tax revenue collected will remain unchanged at \$21,613,705. If approved by voters, the budget would result in a 0% increase in the tax levy.

The 2021-22 budget aligns with and supports the FCSD's Five-Year Strategic Coherence Plan which clearly outlines our district's goals and strategies to achieve our vision and mission and to ensure coherence in everything we do. The framework of the plan directs us toward focusing the direction of the district, developing a collaborative culture, deepening our learning, and

securing accountability in all aspects of the organization. Areas of concentration in the plan are leadership, literacy, instruction, social-emotional developmental health, family engagement and innovation. In December 2020, the Board of Education identified specific parameters in each area as part of the budget design process and they are available on the district website. I encourage all community members to review the Strategic Coherence Plan and become familiar with the focus areas within the plan. Throughout the year, and in future years, we will provide updates on our journey.

The proposed budget maintains and ensures high-quality instructional programs, student support services, and extra-curricular opportunities that will position students to be prepared for a complex and ever-changing world. Student and staff safety continues to be one of our highest priorities and work on our capital improvement projects are providing upgrades at each of our schools. We also continue to explore ways to utilize the benefits of being a part of the BOCES through purchasing and leasing which results in maximizing dollars and available resources.

The proposed 2021-22 budget directs 75% of funds to student instruction, services and programs. The capital and debt portion of the budget makes up 14.4% while administration comprises the remaining 10.6%. State aid will provide 68.5% of the revenue, with the local tax levy providing 28.4%, planned use of reserves and assigned fund balance and other revenues contributing 3.1% of support.

What is the impact of Federal Stimulus Funds on the FCSD?

The Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA) coupled with the American Rescue Plan (ARP) provide a combined one-time allocation of \$14,453,105 that is considered "special aid" and supplemental in nature. Allowable uses of these funds are defined and there is an associated application process for acquisition. Upon receipt of the applications and associated parameters, FCSD will design the required plan with stakeholder input and feedback. There are requirements for a minimum of 20% of the funds to be targeted to address learning loss through use of evidence-based interventions and that those interventions respond to students' social, emotional, and academic needs for all students and their unique individual needs. We will be sharing information as it is received and I look forward to your insights and feedback.

Voting will take place Tuesday, May 18, from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., at the Fulton War Memorial, 609 West Broadway. Mask wearing and social distancing will be required. Please remember to vote. Your voice matters!

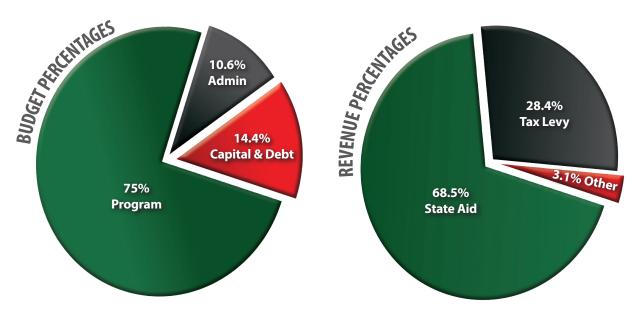

PROPOSITION NO. 1: BUDGET PROPOSITION

Shall the Fulton City District Board of Education be authorized to expend the sum of \$76,230,000 as a general fund appropriation for the 2021-2022 school year and to levy the necessary tax therefore?

PROPOSITION NO. 2: STUDENT TRANSPORTATION VEHICLES

Shall the Bond Resolution adopted by the Board of Education authorizing the purchase of one (1) wheel chair bus for school transportation, including related furnishings and equipment incidental thereto, at a total estimated cost not to exceed \$79,500 and the payment of the costs of the Project by the levy of a tax upon all the taxable real property of the District in the amount of \$79,500 which tax shall be levied and collected in annual installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education and, if necessary, in anticipation of such tax the issuance of bonds and bond anticipation notes in the principal amount not to exceed \$79,500 and the levy of a tax to pay the interest on said obligations, be approved?

"The esports industry surpassed \$1 billion in revenue with many local and regional colleges offering adopting teams," Mr. Pulvino said. "We expect our district's esports league will allow our students to experience a seamless transition to collegiate leagues after graduation."

While a team coach has yet to be determined, the district's first esports offerings are being scheduled for this summer.
